


## Epitaph with Latin inscription for a child



## Subject

Epitaph bearing an inscription in Latin (CIL VI.17805).

You read: D M FELICISSIMAE Â· FIL DVLCISSIMAE Â· QVAE VIX Â· ANNVM Â· M Â· IIII Â· D Â· V L  
Â· AVFIDIVS Â· EVTYCHVS ET Â· EVGENIA Â· MATER FECERVNT.

Transliteration: D(is) M(anibus) felicissimae fil(iae) dulcissimae quae vix(it) annum m(enses) IIII d(ies) V  
L(ucius) Aufidius Eutyclus et Eugenia mater fecerunt.

Translation: "To the spirits of the deceased. Lucius Aufidius Eutyclus and Eugenia, (her) mother,  
made (this) for the heappiest (and) sweetest daughter, who lived one year, four months (and) five  
days".
